IT HAS BEEN MY GOAL TO TEACH THIS CAST HOW TO SING IN A WAY THAT WILL BENEFIT THEM FOR YEARS TO COME. I HOPE THEY WILL REMEMBER THE THINGS THEY HAVE LEARNED IN REHEARSAL AND APPLY THEM TO SHOWS THEY DO IN THE FUTURE.
